WHO WE ARE – Australian Antarctic Division (AAD)

The AAD is part of the Commonwealth Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW). As primary agency for Australia's Antarctic Program (AAP), the AAD is responsible for achieving the Australian Government's Antarctic goals to:

- maintain the Antarctic Treaty System and enhance Australia's influence within it
- protect the Antarctic environment
- understand the role of Antarctica in the global climate system
- undertake scientific work of practical, economic and national significance.

THE JOB

As an Antarctic Refueller you will assist the Refuelling Supervisor in the execution of the refuelling operation in Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic including; delivery of briefings, equipment set up, relief supervision of the refuelling operation and equipment pack up. The Antarctica Refueller will work closely with other voyage support staff, members of the shipboard and station-base Mechanical Team.

Resupply of fuel is usually accomplished by the transfer of bulk fuel from ship to shore through a fuel hose. Fuel transfer may occur over water or over ice, depending on weather and ice conditions and proximate to the station. The transfer of bulk fuel in an environmentally sensitive location and Antarctic conditions requires the effective management of significant safety and environmental risks.

The Antarctic Refueller works up to 8 months throughout the summer season on multiple voyages.

You should apply for this role if you have the appropriate knowledge, skills and experience and an interest in the challenge of living and working in a small community in a remote environment.

Applicants will be assessed and if successful placed in a role for training and deployment, or a merit pool that will be used for future seasons.

Key duties will include, but are not limited to:

As an Antarctic Refueller you will be required to undertake some or all of the following:

- Assist with the preparation and testing of refuelling equipment in Hobart prior to the commencement of a resupply voyage.
- Regularly step up as Refuelling Supervisor and take responsibility for the conduct of ship to shore, station refuelling operations in Antarctica and Macquarie Island.
- Provide input as required into the refuelling report after each voyage.
- Provision of advice on the development of refuelling systems to enable station refuelling to occur from various ships as required.
- Liaise with voyage support staff, members of the shipboard and station-base Mechanical Team and other operational areas within the AAD in relation to refuelling operations.
- Provision of advice on the continuous improvement of refuelling equipment and systems to ensure the AAD has the most robust and efficient refuelling system available.

- Sound judgement in time-limited, pressure situations with the ability to follow Standard Operating Procedures at all times.
- Strong, proactive focus on protection of the Antarctic environment through the responsible management of bulk fuel transfer activities.

WHO WE ARE – Australian Antarctic Division (AAD)

THE JOB

As a Refuelling Supervisor you will be responsible for the safe and efficient transfer of fuel and associated activities during the course of station resupply. These activities include supervising and taking responsibility for the conduct of ship to shore, station refuelling operations in Antarctica and the Sub-Antarctic.

Resupply of fuel is usually accomplished by the transfer of bulk fuel from ship to shore through a fuel hose. Fuel transfer may occur over water or over ice, depending on weather and ice conditions and the proximate to the station. The transfer of bulk fuel in an environmentally sensitive location and Antarctic conditions requires the effective management of significant safety and environmental risks.

The Refuelling Supervisor will work under limited direction from the Voyage Leader for the safe and efficient transfer of fuel and associated activities during the course of the voyage. You will manage the repair, service, modification and testing of refuelling equipment used in support of Australia's Antarctic Program while in Hobart or other designated ports of departure.

The Refuelling Supervisor works up to 8 months throughout the summer season on multiple voyages.

You should apply for this role if you have the appropriate knowledge, skills and experience and an interest in the challenge of living and working in a small community in a remote environment. Applicants will be assessed and if successful placed in a role for training and deployment, or a merit pool that will be used for future seasons.

Key duties will include, but are not limited to:

As a Refuelling Supervisor, you will be required to undertake some or all of the following:

- Supervision and taking responsibility for the conduct of ship to shore, station refuelling operations in Antarctica and Macquarie Island.
- Preparation and testing of refuelling equipment in Hobart prior to the commencement of each Antarctic shipping season.
- Development of Standard Operating Procedures (SOP's) and operating Instructions to ensure refuelling operations are conducted in a safe and efficient manner.
- Ensuring that all refuelling equipment required for the voyage is on board the ship before departure and is accessible as required.
- Preparation of reports on completion of all refuelling operations.
- Provision of advice on the development of refuelling systems to enable station refuelling to occur from various ships as required.
- Provision of advice on the continuous improvement of refuelling equipment and systems to ensure the AAD has the most robust and efficient refuelling system available.
